

SAMPLES OF BIBLIOGRAPHIC CITATIONS FOR ELECTRONIC PUBLICATIONS

Kate L. Turabian's *Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, Seventh ed. Section 15.4.1 states: "Many online sources are like print sources in everything except medium." Those sources can be cited like print medium with the addition of the URL and data accessed. Others are considered "informally published" and will need more information. Examples below are taken from the seventh edition of the manual.

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BIBLIOGRAPHIC CITATIONS: TURABIAN, SCIENTIFIC STYLE

Two forms of citation are permitted by Turabian, the scientific, or parenthetical reference list method, detailed here, and the humanities, or traditional method detailed in its own pathfinder. Samples are taken from Turabian, Kate L. 2007. *A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*. 7th ed. Revised by Wayne C. Booth and Gregory G. Colomb and Joseph M. Williams. Chicago: University of Chicago Press.

- All references should be single-spaced with one blank line between entries.
- The first line of each entry is flush left, and any additional lines are indented the same space as paragraphs.
- The number to the left of the sample citations indicates where to find more information in the Turabian manual.

19.1.1 Book, One Author

The full titles and subtitles of books are capitalized sentence style.

Ball, Philip. 2001. *Bright earth: Art and the invention of color*. New York: Farrar, Straus and Giroux.

18.2.1 Several Works by the Same Author, or Group of Authors

When several works by the same author or group of authors are cited, arrange the entries chronologically by publication date.

Gates, Henry Louis Jr. 1989. *The signifying monkey: A theory of African-American literary criticism*. New York: Oxford University Press.

_____, ed. 2002. *The classic slave narratives*. New York: Penguin Putnam.

19.1.1 Book, Two or More Authors

For works having more than three authors, invert the name of the first author and list the rest of the authors in standard order. Do not use *et al*.

Bird, Kai, and Martin J. Sherwin. 2005. *American Prometheus: The triumph and tragedy of J. Robert Oppenheimer*. New York: Alfred A. Knopf.

Encyclopedia Articles

Well-known reference books are generally not listed in bibliographies.
